Nancy Dorrier '66 A Global Citizen

Nancy Dorrier is not only a successful business-woman but also a global citizen and humanitarian. She is also a 1966 graduate of Queens.

Dorrier says one of her best experiences at Queens was hearing Nina Simone in the gymnasium. "Nina Simone!" Dorrier laughs. "Ten feet away, playing her piano and singing just for us!" Another favorite memory is Dr. Charles Hadley and Dr. Charleen Swansea reading poetry while Loonis McGlohon played piano.

After she graduated from Queens with a degree in psychology, Dorrier married and went to work for the department of social services, where she worked with Charles Kuralt's father who was the welfare department chief. From there, Dorrier went into private practice, where many of her clients were business executives. She applied the family systems theory – which states that if there were a problem within a family it is systemic, not individual – and realized her approach would be well-suited for the business world. In 1986, Dorrier took out a second mortgage on her home and co-founded

Dorrier-Underwood, a management-consulting firm. Dorrier-Underwood now has clients worldwide. "We focus on long range and succession planning with executives and executive development," Dorrier says. "Our biggest tool is communication. We not only help people problem-solve but also help individuals find more meaning in their work."

Most people jog around their neighborhood for exercise. Not Dorrier. In 1990, she went to Tanzania (*where the above pictures were taken*) and ran in a marathon to help raise money for world hunger. And there Dorrier's life changed forever. While she was in Tanzania, Dorrier got to know the people of Maasai, in the village of Longido. Learning that the Maasai had no clean, running water available, she set about raising the \$10,000 needed to bring it to them. Dorrier has maintained her relationship with the Maasai and will return in 2004 to continue working on a documentary on the women of East Africa. "The film is about their faith, hope and work," says Dorrier. "They're not victims of circumstance. They're dreamers and are making things happen." Dorrier says that there is vocational training for the women now. "All of this is at their request," Dorrier points out. "Our mission is to have a partnership."

Her last trip to Tanzania was two years ago. "Every time I go, I learn something new," she says. "It takes me a couple of days to adjust," she adds. "The Serengeti is romantic, but hard, dusty and dirty. If there is reincarnation, I want to come back as an African. It is so beautiful: the stars, wildlife, people."

Dorrier says she has learned a lot from the Maasai. "They are very clear that you can't do anything alone. It's all about community, and a different kind of wealth. It's an experience of "reverse mission," where the giver is the one who really receives something of value," she says. Dorrier, truly a global citizen, was granted the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award at the Queens University of Charlotte May 2003 Commencement for her humanitarian work. The Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award recognizes "those who move beyond the narrow circle of their self-interest and spend themselves in the interest of humanity."

Dorrier has two children, Thomas (*pictured top standing next to his mother*) and Alice-Lyle Hazel Hickson '94, and three grandchildren.
